## "INTRODUCTION

มู่ อาคาร ได้เรียงสู่สู่สู่สู่สุดให้เปลี่ยงคือ เดิดเก็บ เสอไ Grantham Chess Club established in 1984 must rank as one of the most ancient functioning clubs in Britain and certainly within Lincolnshire and neighbouring counties. Current Chairman Arthur Jones has been actively connected for 36 years and is at present leisurely researching into its history with intent to publish a book on this subject very soon. Perhaps the most interesting period throughout the chequered 110 years of its existence might prove to be the past five years. Certainly this particular portion of time has indeed been most active with many achievements being accomplished.

# PERFORMANCE AND SPORTSMANSHIP OVER THE YEAR

In 1983 Grantham Chess Club had three teams in the Notts League and before commencement of the 1983/84 season all three teams were promoted to League Divisions 1,2 and 4 respectively. Whilst the "A" team struggled for survival in the strong Premier Notts League they are still competing and hope to do better in the forthcoming season 1984/85. The "B" team were again promoted from Division 2 so now we have two teams competing in Division 1 for the first time. Our "C" team finished high up in fifth place from 14 teams participating. Our team of four players in Lincs and South Humberside League Division 2 again won this competition, that's twice consecutively and for the third time in four seasons and scored maximum points with eight wins from eight matches played. It is worth mentioned that in both the Nottinghamshire and Lincolnshire Leagues Grantham Chess Club fulfilled all fixtures without default of a single board or match despite geographical difficulties involving considerable travel and transport problems and expense during winter months and inclement weather.

#### STABILITY OF THE CLUB

The premises are a private hotel pleasingly situated on the fringe of a small country town where we meet weekly on Wednesday evenings under the auspices of sympathetic proprietors in a private room hired at generously low rentage for the past four years. There is generally a pleasant and friendly atmosphere and excellent facilities. Membership is comprised of juniors and seniors of both sexes (32 in all) with ages varying from approximately 7-70. Apart from commitments in County League Matches there are inner club competitions organised which involve the whole membership. A senior member captains Lincs County second team, the Club Chairman is another senior member with many years of loyal service and direct communications although most other officials and committee members are much younger but equally dedicated chess enthusiasts. These are elected by popular vote at well attended AGM's. We regard this annual event as the most important of our chess calendar and ensures maximum attendance and interest amongst all members including juniors thus gaining total confidence and support for all our various activities.

Perhaps this is the strongest feature and accounts largely for our success as a small provincial chess club. There is in fact no other way in which such a club devoid of grants and subsidiaries can survive or flourish unless it tackles chess at grass roots level and to do this properly requires proper leadership. Grantham Chess Club has a nicely balanced general staff. Officers and Committee do seriously try to carry out the members decisions. They work closely together as a team comprising of experience and youth. The Committee do not merely meet formally at intervals but also enjoy regular almost daily contact with each other by telephone and meet at least once per week socially mainly to discuss local chess. In fact whether socially over a pint or formally in Committee we do have the best interests of the whole membership and promotion of local chess at heart. Our Club organises an individual junior competition (open to all juniors, locally and not merely junior members of Grantham Chess Club). We established a Grantham chess league 5 years ago for players below 110 grade. There are two divisions with three players per each team. We play two matches annually home and away against Grantham Kings School with teaching staff and pupils involved. Some of thebest scholars and chess players join our town club. Grantham Chess Club hold two lightning Chess Tournaments per year and we play friendly matches against nearby clubs such as Wisbech, Peterborough Melton Mo wbray home and away. We also play correspondence chess at both home and abroad Wisbech, St Augustin and Bonn. We have excellent relations with the Nottinghamshire and Lincolnshire Leagues and attend all their annual meetings and conferences regularly with more than one delegate. Grantham Chess Club members also participate in relative strength at all neighbouring congresses and other various chess events. We are holding our fourth Annual Open Chess Congress which is a friendly enjoyable annual fixture entirely independent of sponsorship. We have excellent relationships with the local press with a regular chess column reserved weekly and submitted by the Club Chairman. This chess column has now appeared with continuity for the past 28 issues and ks likely to continue indefinitely. A SAN SECTION SECTION SANCES AND ASSESSED.

We are very proud of our local chess club which relies more upon voluntary co-ordinated spontaneous enthusiasm for the hoble game at grass roots level than the sponsorship and subsidies received by many much larger and not always better managed chess clubs.
